James, son of Zebedee?

Matthew 4:21-22

Going on from there, he saw two other brothers, James, son of Zebedee and his brother John. They were in a boat with their father Zebedee, preparing their nets. Jesus called them, ²² and immediately they left the boat and their father and followed him.

Matthew 17:1-3

After six days Jesus took with him Peter, <u>James</u>, and John the brother of James, and led them up a high mountain by themselves. ² There he was transfigured before them. His face shone like the sun, and his clothes became as white as the light. ³ Just then there appeared before them Moses and Elijah, talking with Jesus...

Acts 12:1-2

It was about this time that King Herod arrested some who belonged to the church, intending to persecute them. ² He had <u>James</u>, the brother of John, put to death with the sword. [approx. 44-AD]

James, son of Alphaeus?

Matthew 10:2-4

These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon (who is called Peter) and his brother Andrew; James, son of Zebedee, and his brother John; ³ Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; <u>James, son of Alphaeus</u>, and Thaddaeus; ⁴ Simon the Zealot and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him.

Acts 1:13

When they arrived, they went upstairs to the room where they were staying. Those present were Peter, John, James, and Andrew; Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew; <u>James, son of Alphaeus</u> and Simon the Zealot, and Judas, son of James.

Note: Acts 1:13 appears to be the last time James, son of Alphaeus is mentioned. Tradition says that James, son of Alphaeus was stoned to death by the Jews.

James, son of Joseph?

Matthew 13:54-56

Coming to his hometown, he began teaching the people in their synagogue, and they were amazed. "Where did this man get this wisdom and these miraculous powers?" they asked. ⁵⁵ "Isn't this the carpenter's son? Isn't his mother's name Mary, and aren't his brothers James, Joseph, Simon, and Judas? ⁵⁶ Aren't all his sisters with us? Where then did this man get all these things?"

Acts 15:12-13

The whole assembly became silent as they listened to Barnabas and Paul telling about the miraculous signs and wonders God had done among the Gentiles through them. ¹³ When they finished, <u>James</u> spoke up: "Brothers, listen to me. ¹⁴ Simon [Peter] has described to us how God at first showed his concern by taking from the Gentiles a people for himself..."

Galatians 1:18-20

[Paul wrote,] Then after three years, I went up to Jerusalem to get acquainted with Peter and stayed with him fifteen days. ¹⁹ I saw none of the other apostles — only <u>James</u>, the Lord's brother. ²⁰ I assure you before God that what I am writing you is no lie.

- Author: "The writer of this [letter] has been identified with James the Just, first bishop of Jerusalem, the brother of our Lord." Punchard, D D; https://biblehub.com/commentaries/ellicott/james/1.htm] Editorial: fascinating logic and process of elimination to identify the author as James, the step-brother of Jesus, the son of Joseph the carpenter.
- Date of the Epistle: "The Epistle has been called 'general' that is, 'universal' chiefly because it was addressed to no body of believers in one place in particular. The absence of all allusion to Gentile converts fairly proves an earlier date

than the circular letter preserved in Acts 15:24-29, that is, somewhere about the year A.D. 44. And, if such be correct, we must look on this as one of the oldest writings in the canon of the New Testament." [ibid.]

- Audience: Jewish Believers in Christ Jesus; "these remnants of the house of Israel . . . Scattered . . . 'a by-word among all nations' (Deuteronomy 28:37) . . . wherever the Lord had driven them." [ibid.]
- Death of James the Just: "the plain truth seems that James the Just was hurled from a pinnacle of the Temple, and finally despatched (sic) by stoning, as a believer in Jesus of Nazareth, about the year 69-A.D., immediately before the siege of Jerusalem by the Roman emperor Vespasian [in 70-A.D.]. Josephus accuses the high priest Ananus, a Sadducee, of the judicial murder, and declares that the 'most equitable of the citizens, . . . were . . . most uneasy at the breach of the laws, disliked what was done,' and complained to King Agrippa and Albinus the procurator, who, in consequence, removed Ananus from his office." [ibid.] [Note: Josephus lived in the 1st century and provides independent, extra-Biblical corroboration of 1st century Jewish history]

Lesson 1: James 1:1-27

For the foolishness of God is wiser than man's wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than man's strength.

The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge, but fools despise wisdom and discipline...

²⁰ Wisdom calls aloud in the street, she raises her voice in the public squares; ²¹ at the head of the noisy streets she cries out, in the gateways of the city she makes her speech: 22 "How long will you simple ones love your simple ways? How long will mockers delight in mockery and fools hate knowledge? ²³ If you had responded to my rebuke, I would have poured out my heart to you and made my thoughts known to you. ²⁴ But since you rejected me when I called and no one gave heed when I stretched out my hand, ²⁵ since you ignored all my advice and would not accept my rebuke, ²⁶ I in turn will laugh at your disaster; I will mock when calamity overtakes you – ²⁷ when calamity overtakes you like a storm, when disaster sweeps over you like a whirlwind, when distress and trouble overwhelm you.

²⁸ "Then they will call to me but I will not answer; they will look for me but will not find me. ²⁹ Since they hated knowledge and did not choose to fear the LORD, 30 since they would not accept my advice and spurned my rebuke, 31 they will eat the fruit of their ways and

be filled with the fruit of their schemes. ³² For the waywardness of the simple will kill them, and the complacency of fools will destroy them; ³³ but whoever listens to me will live in safety and be at ease, without fear of harm."

⁶ But when he asks, he must believe and not doubt, because he who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind. ⁷ That man should not think he will receive anything from the Lord; ⁸ he is a double-minded man, unstable in all he does.

	Firstfruits: According to the Levitical ceremonial, the first sheaf of the new crop, accompanied with sacrifice, was presented in the Temple on the day after the Passover Sabbath. No part of the harvest was permitted to be used for food until after this acknowledgment, that all had come from God and belonged to Him. A similar law applied to the first-born of men and of cattle. Both were regarded as in a special sense consecrated to and belonging to God. Now, in the New Testament, both these ideas of 'the first-born' and 'the first-fruits,' which run as you see parallel in some important aspects, are transferred to Jesus Christ Thus, both these phrases are further transferred in the New Testament to Christian people.
