Jesus' Commission of Paul's Servanthood

Colossians 1:24-29 [The Message (MSG); a paraphrase]


[The remaining six verses of Chapter 1 are reproduced, below. Sometimes, a different version/translation will help us to better understand the intent of the author, the Apostle Paul.]

²⁴⁻²⁵ I want you to know how glad I am that it's me sitting here in this jail and not you. There's a lot of suffering to be entered into in this world — the kind of suffering Christ takes on. I welcome the chance to take my share in the church's part of that suffering. When I became a servant in this church, I experienced this suffering as a sheer gift, God's way of helping me serve you, laying out the whole truth.

²⁶⁻²⁹ This mystery has been kept in the dark for a long time, but now it's out in the open. God wanted everyone, not just Jews, to know this rich and glorious secret inside and out, regardless of their background, regardless of their religious standing. The mystery in a nutshell is just this: Christ is in you, so therefore you can look forward to sharing in God's glory. It's that simple. That is the substance of our Message. We preach Christ, warning people not to add to the Message. We teach in a spirit of profound common sense so that we can bring each person to maturity. To be mature is to be basic. Christ! No more, no less. That's what I'm working so hard at day after day, year after year, doing my best with the energy God so generously gives me.

²⁴ Now I rejoice in what was suffered for you, and I fill up in my flesh what is still lacking in regard to Christ's afflictions, for the sake of his body, which is the church.

According to tradition this was Paul's prison cell in Rome, Italy.

The ancient Carcer Tullianum (or the Mamertine Prison) was a maximum-security prison. For many centuries the Roman Government confined their enemies within, while they awaited execution. According to tradition, both Apostles Peter and Paul were held here before they were martyred for their faith.

2 Corinthians 11:22-28 [NIV-1984]

[Paul lists his Jewish credentials (verse 22) and then follows with the hardships he had experienced while proclaiming the Gospel of Christ Jesus during his missionary journeys.]

²² What anyone else dares to boast about — I am speaking as a fool — I also dare to boast about. Are they Hebrews? So am I. Are they Israelites? So am I. Are they Abraham's descendants? So am I. ²³ Are they servants of Christ? (I am out of my mind to talk like this.) I am more.

I have worked much harder, been in prison more frequently, been flogged more severely, and been exposed to death again and again. ²⁴ Five times I received from the Jews the forty lashes minus one. ²⁵ Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was stoned, three times I was shipwrecked, I spent a night

and a day in the open sea, ²⁶ I have been constantly on the move. I have been in danger from rivers, in danger from bandits, in danger from my own countrymen, in danger from Gentiles; in danger in the city, in danger in the country, in danger at sea; and in danger from false brothers. ²⁷ I have labored and toiled and have often gone without sleep; I have known hunger and thirst and have often gone without food; I have been cold and naked.

²⁸ Besides everything else, I face daily the pressure of my concern for all the churches.

Q4. Should a Believer expect hardships?

Jesus in His 'Sermon on the Mount' (Matthew 5:10-12 ψ) promises persecution in this world for we who believe in His saving grace.

The world is under Satan's management. Satan lost you when you came to believe in the saving grace of Christ Jesus; and Satan shouts, "One is too many! No more!" Satan does not want you or I to be successful in our ministries. Satan hates to lose and does not want to lose more souls — through our efforts and Christ-like examples — to the Redeemer Christ Jesus. Satan will use subterfuge, roadblocks, and outright persecution to thwart, blunt, and — his best outcome — stop our ministries, and to 'teach us a lesson'.

Of course, you and I want to be successful in our ministries, because we want everyone to experience the joyful, loving embrace of our Savior Christ Jesus of Nazareth. We want our loved ones, our spouse, our children, our grandchildren, our BFFs (best friends forever) to be in Paradise with us for all eternity.

Prayer, Bible Studies, and continued obedience/action are the best shields to turn aside Satan's hostility and malignant strategies. We must always remember to clothe ourselves with the "Full Armor of God" as described in Paul's Letter to the Ephesians 6:10-18 (see Lesson / StudySheet #12: Ephesians 6:10-24).

	Per a Gallup Poll, dated March 25, 2024: "Two decades ago, an average of 42% of U.S. adults attended religious services every week or nearly every

week. A decade ago, the figure fell to 38%, and it is currently at 30%. This decline is largely driven by the increase

in the percentage of Americans with no religious affiliation — 9% in 2000-2003 versus 21% in 2021-2023 — almost all of whom do not attend services regularly.

"Still, most religious groups have also seen a decline in regular attendance at religious services over the past two decades. . . .

"Bottom Line: On any given weekend, about three in ten U.S. adults attend religious services, down from 42% two decades ago. Church attendance will likely continue to decline in the future, given younger Americans' weaker attachments to religion.

"Specifically, more 18- to 29-year-olds, 35%, say they have no religious preference than identify with any specific faith, such as Protestant/nondenominational Christian (32%) or Catholic (19%). Additionally, young adults, both those with and without a religious preference, are much less likely to attend religious services — 22% attend regularly, eight points below the national average." Now the Bereans were of more noble character than the Thessalonians, for they received the message with great eagerness and examined the Scriptures every day to see if what Paul said was true.

Doctor Luke wrote both the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles as guided by the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit emphasized the wonderful example of the Thessalonians (Acts 17:11 \uparrow) as they compared Paul's words to the Old Testament Scriptures and ensured that Paul's words were in harmony with Scripture. We, who believe, are to do likewise. We are to compare all we hear or read against the foundation of Scripture. We must not accept these StudySheets as Biblical, without comparing them against Scripture. The same is true about preachers' teachings, revisionist teachers who loudly claim they are "Christian" while promoting an askew Biblical teaching, and advice from fellow church-goers. Scripture must be our foundation. Our attitudes, our deeds, our words must harmonize with Scripture — we must follow the example of Christ Jesus.

The Apostle Paul encountered great evil in his missionary journeys. Frequently, after he had planted a church, ensured that it was strong, and then travelled to another village in desperate need of hearing the Gospel of Christ

We must remember that Paul is so singularly focused on spreading the Gospel of Christ Jesus that almost everything else in his life is pushed aside. The exception might be his tent-making vocation which he uses to fund his austere lifestyle and far-reaching ministry.

Galatians 1:12 [English Standard Version (ESV)]

Jesus, Satan would send in 'disciples' (e.g., Judaizers) to the fledgling church. The Judaizers would preach a twisted gospel — an enticing gospel that claimed salvation came from following Jewish laws, plus Christ Jesus. Many of Paul's Letters were written to combat those erroneous teachings, to rebuke the Believers for accepting the perverted teachings of the Judaizers, and to vociferously argue that Paul's original teachings were correct because he was preaching and teaching those words and concepts that he obtained directly through revelation from Christ Jesus Himself.

For I did not receive it from any man, nor was I taught it, but I received it through a revelation of

Sometimes the translations from the original manuscripts are easy; sometimes discerning the writer's original intent and then choosing the correct meaning in today's English is difficult. (For example, the Greel language had nine (9) different words for the English word "love"! See Greek definitions for "love".) The commentator Albert Barnes provides this insight: [The Greek word which is translated as 'struggling'] "re fers here to the anxious care, the mental conflict, the earnest solicitude which he [Paul] had in their behalf, in view of the dangers to which they were exposed from Judaizing Christians and Pagan philosophy [a]nd for them a Laodicea, for [the] Christians there, who were exposed to similar danger. Laodicea was the capital of Phrygia, in Asia Minor, and a little south of Colossae There was a[n early] church planted there — the 'lukewarm' church mentioned in Revelation 3:14. Being in the vicinity of Colossae, the church there would be exposed to the same perils [T]he rebuke of Revelation 3:14, showed that the fears of Paul were well founded, and that the [arguments of the false teachers were too successful." The great street of the city was of pure gold, like transparent glass.

²³ The city does not need the sun or the moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and the Lamb is its lamp.
