## Present Sufferings and Future Glory

<sup>18</sup> I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us.

And he carried me away in the Spirit to a great, high mountain, and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God,

#### Revelation 21:23-24 [English Standard Version (ESV)]

<sup>23</sup> And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and its lamp is the Lamb. <sup>24</sup> By its light will the nations walk, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it,

#### **Revelation 22:5** [English Standard Version (ESV)]

And night will be no more. They will need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign forever and ever.

### 2 Corinthians 4:16-18 [The Message (MSG); a paraphrase]

<sup>16-18</sup> So we're not giving up. How could we! Even though on the outside it often looks like things are falling apart on us, on the inside, where God is making new life, not a day goes by without his unfolding grace. These hard times are small potatoes compared to the coming good times, the lavish celebration prepared for us. There's far more here than meets the eye. The things we see now are here today, gone tomorrow. But the things we can't see now will last forever.

By this, therefore, Christians maybe sustained. Their sufferings may seem great; but they should remember that they are nothing in comparison with future glory. They are nothing in degree. For these are light compared with that "eternal weight of glory" which they shall "work out." 2 Corinthians 4:17 (♥). They are nothing in duration. For these sufferings are but for a moment; but the glory shall be eternal. These will soon pass away; but that glory shall never become dim or diminished; it will increase and expand forever and ever." *Eager expectation*: "A single word in the Greek, and a very striking one. It means, literally, a straining forward with outstretched head, just as we might imagine the crowds outside a race-course straining over the ropes to catch a sight of the runners; an eager, intent expectation. The same word is used once again in the New Testament (Philippians 1:20)."

Creation: "the whole world of nature, animate and inanimate."

••••	The commentator Albert Barnes offers the following explanations as he dissects this verse:  **Groaning*: "All is united in a condition of sorrow. The expression denotes mutual and universal grief. It is one wide and loud lamentation, in which a dying world unites; and in which it has united

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*Childbirth*: "This expression properly denotes the extreme pain of [childbirth]. It also denotes any intense agony, or extreme suffering; and it means here that the condition of all things has been that of intense, united, and continued suffering; in other words, that we are in a world of misery and death. . . . every age has experienced the repetition of the same thing.

**Right up to the present time**: ". . . It has been the characteristic of every age. . . [The Apostle Paul] simply [refers] to the fact that it suffers, as an illustration that the condition of the Christian is not singular and special." But as the privileges described Romans 8:24-26 equally belong to all, it seems more probable that the apostle speaks of believers in general, who had the gifts of the Spirit bestowed on them as first-fruits, or as the earnest of those greater virtues and spiritual endowments, which they shall enjoy in heaven." #### 1 Corinthians 15:42-56 [NIV-1984]

<sup>42</sup> So will it be with the resurrection of the dead. The body that is sown is perishable, it is raised imperishable; <sup>43</sup> it is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory; it is sown in weakness, it is raised in power; <sup>44</sup> it is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual body.

<sup>45</sup> So it is written: "The first man Adam became a living being"; the last Adam, a lifegiving spirit.

<sup>46</sup> The spiritual did not come first, but the natural, and after that the spiritual.

<sup>47</sup> The first man was of the dust of the earth, the second man from heaven.

<sup>48</sup> As was the earthly man, so are those who are of the earth; and as is the man from heaven, so also are those who are of heaven.

<sup>49</sup> And just as we have borne the likeness of the earthly man, so shall we bear the likeness of the man from heaven.

For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed. <sup>53</sup> For the perishable must clothe itself with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality. <sup>54</sup> When the perishable has been clothed with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality, then the saying that is written will come true: "Death has been swallowed up in victory." [From Isaiah 25:8] <sup>55</sup> "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" [From Hosea 13:14] <sup>56</sup> The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law.

"The commentator Albert Barnes provides this explanation for the phrase "redemption of our bodies":

"The complete recovery of the body from death and corruption. The particular and striking act of the adoption in the day of judgment will be the raising up of the body from the grave, and rendering it immortal and eternally blessed. The particular effects of the adoption in this world are on the soul. The completion of it on the last day will be seen particularly in the body; and thus the entire [person] shall be admitted into the favor of God, and restored from all his sins and all the evil consequences of the fall. The apostle here speaks the language of every Christian. The Christian has joys which the world does not know; but he [or she] has also sorrows; he sighs over his corruption; he is in the midst of calamity; he is going to the grave; and he looks forward to that complete deliverance, and to that elevated state, when, in the presence of an assembled universe, he shall be acknowledged as a child of God."

Q18. How would you explain verse 24 <sup>b</sup> : "But hope that is seen is no hope at all"? (Hint: see verse 24 <sup>c</sup> )		
<sup>25</sup> But if we hope for what we do not yet have, we wait for it patiently.		
This verse emphasizes that when we pray to God, He will answer us sometimes with "Wait".  We humans are an impatient bunch. We like things done on our schedule. Don't be late. Hurry-up. Pronto. Quick. Faster. Lickety-split. On the double. Now!  We truly feel the pressure of 'time' in this world.  Yet, God has His own plan, and He knows how to weave a perfect, beautiful tapestry for each of our lives if we only trust Him. God's tapestry for us gets muddied, complicated, drab, knotted, or holed when we try to help Him outside of His will.  There are Old Testament stories that highlight these attempts to help Him; one such example is Abraham & Sarah (Abram and Sarai): Abraham & Sarah's maidservant Hagar begat a son named Ishmael, who is Abraham's first-born son and was born as a result of trying to help God (Genesis 16); and then Abraham & his wife Sarah begat a son named Isaac, who was born as a result of God's promise (Genesis 21). Judaism/Christianity calls Abraham 'Father' through the linage of Ishmael.
