 Paul gives the glory for “*this ministry*” to God. Paul expresses an overriding principle in his 1st letter to the Thessalonians (↓). The principle is prayer for everything in all circumstances. In other words, cover everything in thanksgiving and supplication — Paul devotes his work to God, and gives God all the praise. Paul writes “*we do not lose heart*”. Paul through his prayers, his obedience, and his servant's attitude obtains strength, wisdom, and courage from God through the Holy Spirit. We should remember Paul's words in the bad times as well as the good!

 This is a thorny question that has perplexed scholars for millennia. And this is my poor attempt to answer the question. As you answered Question 11 (↑), did you include ‘free-will’ (or free-choice) in your answer? God is indeed love and He wants what is best for us — and that best is eternal life in Paradise with Him.

When God became man and walked this earth as Jesus, He performed miracles, demonstrated a servant's heart, spoke Truths that harmonized with the Old Testament Scriptures, and encouraged people in His audiences to “Sin no more and follow me.” Yet, at no time did Jesus say, “You have no choice, you must follow me for I am God.”

We are an obstinate people, and even an earthquake under our easy chair will not budge some of us from our comfort, our complacency, and our desire for things to remain the same.

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God prefers that His actions speak for Him: the beauty of a sunrise/sunset, the shimmering of the aurora borealis; the complexity of our eyeballs; “love at first sight” and the coincidence that our paths crossed (“Co-incidence is a God-incidence in disguise.” [thanks to © <https://www.tremain.us/index.html>]); photographs of our universe from the James Webb Space Telescope; the microscopic worlds revealed under the lens of a microscope; the vast variety of creatures on land and in the sea; the uniqueness of each person on this ball we call earth; the cycle between plants that consume carbon dioxide and expel oxygen, and humans that consume oxygen and expel carbon dioxide; and — the list is endless.

God loves, and He desires our love. The best way to demonstrate our love is through obedience. “Obedience to what?” you might ask. Obedience to the principles sprinkled and repeated throughout God’s all-in-one instruction manual, history book, and descriptions of His character — the Holy Bible, which is comprised of the Old and New Testaments.

Our love for our spouse, our children, our ‘best friend forever’ must be demonstrated every day. It is not enough to say “I love you”. Our actions must demonstrate that love; even to our neighbors. As Jesus taught (by repeating Leviticus 19:18 ↓), ‘Love your neighbor as yourself.’

[Jesus used passages from the Pentateuch (Deuteronomy 6:4-5 and Leviticus 19:18) to answer the question from the Jewish religious leaders. By the way, the Pentateuch is comprised of the first five books of what we call the Old Testament.]

²⁸ One of the teachers of the law came and heard them debating. Noticing that Jesus had given them a good answer, he asked him, "Of all the commandments, which is the most important?"

²⁹ "The most important one," answered Jesus, "is this: 'Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one. ³⁰ Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' ³¹ The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' ² Suppose a man comes into your meeting wearing a gold ring and fine clothes, and a poor man in shabby clothes also comes in. ³ If you show special attention to the man wearing fine clothes and say, "Here's a good seat for you," but say to the poor man, "You stand there" or "Sit on the floor by my feet," ⁴ have you not discriminated among yourselves and become judges with evil thoughts?

⁵ Listen, my dear brothers: Has not God chosen those who are poor in the eyes of the world to be rich in faith and to inherit the kingdom he promised those who love him? ⁶ But you have insulted the poor. Is it not the rich who are exploiting you? Are they not the ones who are dragging you into court? ⁷ Are they not the ones who are slanderous the noble name of him to whom you belong?

⁸ If you really keep the royal law found in Scripture, "Love your neighbor as yourself," you are doing right. ⁹ But if you show favoritism, you sin and are convicted by the law as lawbreakers.

Treasure in Jars of Clay

⁷ But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us.

Q17. *Jars of clay*: What does “jars of clay” represent?

 **Jars of clay**: “It is suited well to represent the human body; frail, fragile, and easily reduced again to dust. The purpose of Paul here is, to show that it was by no excellency of his nature that the gospel was originated; it was in virtue of no vigor and strength which he possessed that it was propagated; but that it had been, of design, committed by God to weak, decaying, and crumbling instruments, in order that it might ‘be seen’ that it was by the power of God that such instruments were sustained in the trials to which they were exposed, and in order that it might be manifest to all that it was not originated and diffused by the power of those to whom it was entrusted. The idea is, that they were altogether insufficient of their own strength to accomplish what was accomplished by the gospel. Paul uses a metaphor similar to this in 2 Timothy 2:20.” [©1834, Notes on the Bible by Albert Barnes. https://biblehub.com/commentaries/2_corinthians/4-7.htm]

⁶ Paul and his companions traveled throughout the region of Phrygia and Galatia, having been kept by the Holy Spirit from preaching the word in the province of Asia.

^{10a} We always carry around in our body the death of Jesus, ^{10b} so that the life of Jesus may also be revealed in our body. ^{11a} For we who are alive are always being given over to death for Jesus' sake, ^{11b} so that his life may be revealed in our mortal body. ^{12a} So then, death is at work in us, ^{12b} but life is at work in you.

Q24. (Verse 10^a) *We always carry around in our body the death of Jesus*: Paul may have been thinking about his own hardships when he wrote these words. What hardships did Paul endure as he preached the Good News of Christ Jesus?

2 Corinthians 11:23-28 [NIV-1984]

²³ Are they servants of Christ? (I am out of my mind to talk like this.) I am more. I have worked much harder, been in prison more frequently, been flogged more severely, and been exposed to death again and again. ²⁴ Five times I received from the Jews the forty lashes minus one. ²⁵ Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was stoned, three times I was shipwrecked, I spent a night and a day in the open sea, ²⁶ I have been constantly on the move. I have been in danger from rivers, in danger from bandits, in danger from my own countrymen, in danger from Gentiles; in danger in the city, in danger in the country, in danger at sea; and in danger from false brothers. ²⁷ I have labored and toiled and have often gone without sleep; I have known hunger and thirst and have often gone without food; I have been cold and naked. ²⁸ Besides everything else, I face daily the pressure of my concern for all the churches.

John 15:17-20 [NIV-1984]

[Jesus speaking to His disciples (and to us):]

¹⁷ This is my command: Love each other.

¹⁸ If the world hates you, keep in mind that it hated me first. ¹⁹ If you belonged to the world, it would love you as its own. As it is, you do not belong to the world, but I have chosen you out of the world. That is why the world hates you. ²⁰ Remember the words I spoke to you: 'No servant is greater than his master.' Lesson 5: 2 Corinthians 4:1-18

What is Unseen is Eternal

¹⁶Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. ¹⁷For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. ¹⁸So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen. For what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal.

Q36. (Verse 16) ***inwardly we are being renewed day by day***: This is not boasting, but encouragement to others. How are you being renewed each day?

Q37. (Verse 17) ***For our light and momentary troubles***: How would you explain this phrase to the victim of a painful physical condition, or the mother who cannot feed her newborn, or the person-of-color who is demeaned?

James 2:14-14 [NIV-1984]

¹⁴What good is it, my brothers, if a man claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save him? ¹⁵Suppose a brother or sister is without clothes and daily food. ¹⁶If one of you says to him, "Go, I wish you well; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about his physical needs, what good is it?

¹⁷In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.

Acts 4:32-35 [NIV-1984]


[The early Church of Christ Jesus:]

³²All the believers were one in heart and mind. No one claimed that any of his possessions was his own, but they shared everything they had.

³³With great power the apostles continued to testify to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and much grace was upon them all. ³⁴There were no needy persons among them. For from time to time those who owned lands or houses sold them, brought the money from the sales ³⁵and put it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to anyone as he had need.

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Q38. (Verse 17) *an eternal glory that far outweighs them all*: How do you explain this phrase?

 ***an eternal glory***: “(δόξης doxēs). The Hebrew word כבוד kabowd denotes weight as well as glory. And perhaps Paul had that use of the word in his eye in this strong expression. It refers here to the splendor, magnificence, honor, and happiness of the eternal world. In this exceedingly interesting passage, which is worthy of the deepest study of Christians, Paul has set in most beautiful and emphatic contrast the trials of this life and the glories of heaven. It may be profitable to contemplate at a single glance the view which he had of them, that they may be brought distinctly before the mind.” [©1834, Notes on the Bible by Albert Barnes. https://biblehub.com/commentaries/2_corinthians/4-17.htm]

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
