2 Corinthians 5:1-5 [The Message (MSG)]

1-5 For instance, we know that when these bodies of ours are taken down like tents and folded away, they will be replaced by resurrection bodies in heaven — God-made, not handmade — and we'll never have to relocate our "tents" again. Sometimes we can hardly wait to move — and so we cry out in frustration. Compared to what's coming, living conditions around here seem like a stopover in an unfurnished shack, and we're tired of it! We've been given a glimpse of the real thing, our true home, our resurrection bodies! The Spirit of God whets our appetite by giving us a taste of what's ahead. He puts a little of heaven in our hearts so that we'll never settle for less.

The commentator Albert Barnes wrote, "[T]he soul will not be naked; that is, destitute of any body, or covering. The present body will be laid aside. It will return to corruption [dust], and the disembodied Spirit will ascend to God and to heaven. It will be disencumbered of the [physical] body with which it has been so long clothed. But we are not thence to infer that it will be destitute of a body; that it will remain a naked soul. It will be clothed there in its appropriate glorified body; and will have an appropriate habitation there." ¹¹Since, then, we know what it is to fear the Lord, we try to persuade men. What we are is plain to God, and I hope it is also plain to your conscience.

Think back to when you were a young child. If you did something wrong or you disappointed your earthly dad or mom, did you fear punishment?

Paul's use of the word "fear" is similar to that feeling of 'worry' I experienced, when my boyish nature did something that I thought was smart to do at the time. Of course, it could have also been something that I was expected to do, but didn't; or something I said, or didn't say. At any rate, I was in Trouble, with a capital "T"!

Thinking back to my childhood, sometimes the look of disappointment on my parent's faces was far worse than any physical punishment (or withheld privileges, such as 'You're grounded!') they could have imposed.

Paul doesn't so much 'fear the Lord' because of the potential of the Lord's actions, but due to the disappointment and reduced respect the Lord may have toward Paul. Neither Paul or we want to hear the Lord exclaim, "I am disappointed in you." We do want to hear, "Well done, good and faithful servant!"

So. We <u>fear</u> the Lord's disapproval of us. We <u>fear</u> the Lord's dissatisfaction with us. God wants us to reach a point in our lives in this world where we love Him so much that we think about Him (and the respect and encouragement He has for us) before we take an action or open our mouths — how will God be affected by what I'm about to do, or say? Does He care when I procrastinate, or would He prefer that I just get it done? Will my actions or comments praise Him, bring Him glory? Encourage someone to seek Him? Dissuade someone from a sin? Demonstrate His love to someone through my servant attitude? Our actions speak much louder than any words we might shout.
